Lent is historically the fast of forty days prior to Easter. In the church's first three centuries, fasting in preparation for Easter did not usually exceed two or three days. By 325 AD and the Council of Nicea, the custom of fasting by candidates for baptism had expanded to forty days, inspired by the forty-day fasts of Moses, Elijah, and especially Jesus. By the 7th Century, a forty-day season from Ash Wednesday to Holy Saturday preceding Easter, excluding Sundays, seems firmly established.

Lent has come to serve as a season of extra devotion to religious exercises, self-reflection, and introspection, with those observing Lent often abstaining from a favorite food or activity as a type of fast.

A church sign posted during the season of Lent read: "God's love is not lent, it is given."

Lent is a period of forty days, not counting Sundays, beginning with Ash Wednesday and ending on the Saturday before Easter.

At its best, Lent reminds us of the imperfect condition of human beings set against the backdrop of both the holiness of God that stands in judgment on our failings and also the love of God that accepts us in our imperfections.

Julie Ackerman Link wrote in *Our Daily Bread*: "One of the most difficult inner conflicts we have is our desire to be known versus our fear of being known. As beings created in the image of God we are made to be known — known by God and also by others. Yet due to our fallen nature, all of us have sins and weaknesses that we don't want others to know about. We use the phrase "dark side" to refer to aspects of our lives that we keep hidden. And we use slogans like "put your best foot forward" to encourage others to show their best side.

One reason we are unwilling to risk being known is that we fear rejection and ridicule. But when we discover that God knows us, loves us, and is willing to forgive even the worst thing we have done, our fear of being known by God begins to fade away. And when we find a community of believers who understands the dynamic relationship between forgiveness and confession, we feel safe confessing our sins to one another (James 5:16).



From the Minister's Desk

The life of faith is not about showing only our good side. It's about exposing our dark side to the light of Christ through confession to God and also to others. In this way we

can receive healing and live in the freedom of forgiveness."

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday's stark reminder of our finitude. We are cosmic dust and ash come to life for a few brief moments blinking out at the universe. We live and love, we succeed and fail, and we work and hope with the knowledge that in the end dust and ash seem to be the last words pronounced over our lives. Christians can find in Lent an opportunity to confess to one another these realities.

Lent, sobering as its message is, takes us from Ash Wednesday to Good Friday. Then Easter morning arrives. The Song of Solomon 8:6 declares that there is a love, "as strong as death, passionate love as unrelenting as the grave.' If Lent is meant to have us take an extended look at ourselves, to come to terms with who we are as creatures limited by time and temptation, Easter comes as the assurance that there is a love that will not abandon us to either sin or death. The story of Jesus' life and death revealed God's love for us. Christians see that love signaled most clearly on the cross and in the empty tomb.

For now, between here and Easter Sunday's risen Christ, we have Lent as a season to reflect on who we are as fallible people infallibly loved by the One who breathes into dust and ash eternal life.


